

#### Pastor Metzger's trip to India

The following is what Pastor Metzger presented to the congregation at our Fellowship Meal in January.

#### A Brief Summary of My Activities in India

As most of you know, I recently made a trip to the city of Guntur in the state of Andhra Pradesh in the southeast part of India. I made the trip at the request and invitation of Rev. Dr. Michael Albrecht, pastor of an independent Lutheran congregation in Minneapolis, MN., who is associated with Luther Academy, an organization which promotes conferences, workshops, and the publication of materials in Confessional Lutheran theology. You may recall that, some years ago, I was asked to be a reactor at a Free Conference in the city of New Ulm, Minnesota. It was Pastor Albrecht who asked me to be part of that conference, and he was also in attendance in Prague for the Reformation Anniversary Conference at which I was asked to make a presentation. Although I had very short notice before the Symposium in India, I was nevertheless glad to accept his invitation.

My trip to India was something of a "whirlwind affair." I left the airport in Philadelphia on Friday, Jan. 3. Pastor Karin Pejack filled in for me here at Old Zion for Epiphany Sunday, Jan. 5. And I was back to preach and conduct services for Sunday, Jan. 12. My advice to anyone planning to travel to India would be that they should allow themselves more time than I gave myself.

#### A Word from the Pastor (Continued)

The Symposium at which I presented was sponsored by the Bible Faith Lutheran Church which is centered in Guntur. Pastor Albrecht provides this Symposium every year for the BFLC. We stayed at the home of Pastor Raju Shalem and his family, an apartment located on the second floor above Moriah Lutheran High School which is run by the BFLC. Each day we would be driven to the site of the Symposium—a very large center for conferences which the BFLC rented from a Pentecostal organization. The presentations given at the Symposium provide a source of ongoing professional enrichment and education for the pastors of the BFLC who have graduated from the seminary there in Guntur and who now serve in some forty-five villages throughout the state of Andhra Pradesh.

In the few days I was there in Guntur, I presented at three sessions of the Symposium, as I expected. The subject of my paper was "Luther on the Psalms. In my paper, I connected Luther to the patristic and medieval tradition of interpreting the psalms and provided Luther's insights into Psalm 1 and Psalm 22. Pastor Albrecht advised me not to cite other sources than Scripture-except perhaps Luther himself—since the pastors attending the Symposium had no other books than the Bible in their homes. The papers presented at the Symposium would become part of their home-libraries. What I had not expected was that Pastor Albrecht would inform me the second day that I was there that I would also be teaching in the seminary for several hours (on the Book of Romans) and that I would be expected to preach for a Vespers Service and for a Matins Service at the Symposium. Needless to say, that made for some frantic evenings of preparation. When I presented, taught, or preached, there was a translator there who put my words into Telugu, the language of Andhra Pradesh and some surrounding areas. Speaking through a translator was a new experience for me. My time in Guntur was both exhilarating and humbling. It was a real thrill to worship with these Lutheran Christians-hearing them sing their hymns and follow their liturgy which is virtually the same as ours. When I looked out over the congregation gathered there in the small church building not far from where we were staying and watched and listened as they joined together in song in praise of Christ, I could not help but think of my own congregation-of how Old Zion praises the Savior in English and in German, and of how your ready reception and greeting of visitors and new members is exactly like the welcome and hospitality I received there, of how you are one with them in faith, and of how you and they would get along so well together.

### **Fellowship Hall Rental Opportunities**

Now that we have incorporated climate control elements into our lovely Fellowship Hall, the council of **Old Zion Lutheran Church** has made the Fellowship Hall available to members, friends, and those in the greater community on a rental basis for various functions, meetings, and events.

The Fellowship Hall is ideal for meetings and classes, small cabaret performances or recitals, and personal celebrations (anniversaries, birthdays, etc). The hall can be rented on an hourly basis at \$150 per hour, or for a larger block of time at a discounted rate (4 hours for \$500). Ongoing rentals can also be considered.

Aside from both heating and cooling to meet your needs, the Fellowship Hall has space for approximately 70-90 people. We can provide tables and chairs to accommodate your guests, easy access to bathrooms, and space to put out any refreshments you may wish to serve. Basic wifi is provided, as is a large projector screen that can be pulled down for your convenience. We ask that any decorations be approved prior to use.
